














The Demographics

<p>The 50-54 year old age group is the most populous.</p>  <p>This group represents 8% of the population, or 10,390 people.</p>	<p>Population of 129,920 in 2016.</p>  <p>The Population has increased by 2.5% since 2011.</p>	<p>Children age 0-14 represent 18.3% of the population.</p>  <p>This is higher than the national (16.6%) and provincial (16.4%) averages.</p>
<p>The fastest growing group is the 65-69 age group.</p>  <p>This group has increased by 32.4% since 2011.</p>		<p>The median age is 39.7 years.</p>  <p>This is up from 38 years in 2011.</p>

<p>Work</p>  <p>23.8% of the employed labor force are in sales and service occupations.</p> <p>16.8% are in trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations.</p>	<p>Food</p>  <p>In Waterloo Region, the cost of eating healthy for a family of four in 2017 was \$835.43 per month.</p> <p>This is a 3.1% decrease from 2016.</p>	
<p>Income</p>  <p>The median after-tax income of lone parent families in 2015 was \$50,283.</p> <p>For couple families with children it was \$98,399, and \$69,461 for those without children.</p>	<p>Education</p>  <p>31% of adults age 25-64 have a high school education.</p> <p>55.3% have a post-secondary education.</p> <p>13.8% have no certificate, degree or diploma.</p>	
<p>18.1% of families are lone-parent led.</p>  <p>Lone-parent families make approximately \$48,000 less than couple-with-children families.</p>	<p>10.8% of the population, or 13,850 people, are living at or below the Low Income Measure - After-Tax Line.</p>  <p>4,180 of these people are children under 18.</p>	<p>The low income measure after-tax (LIM-AT) for a one-person household in 2015 is \$22,133.</p> 
<p>79.6% of lone-parents are female.</p> <p>3 in 4</p> 	<p>To be considered affordable, a household should spend no more than 30% of its income on housing costs.</p> <p>Many households spend more than this.</p> <p>Homeowners: 15%</p> <p>Renters: 41%</p> 	<p>In Cambridge, 10.8% of people live in low income.</p>
